The Spider & The Fly

Text: Proverbs 7:1-27

Introduction

An ancient fable talks about the cunning spider's lure of an unsuspecting fly. The fly zooms closer to the enticing web, and the spider beckons with her "Welcome to my web." She finally coaxes him to make a landing, and the fly suddenly discovers that he is fatally ensnared. In this chapter, Solomon observes such a snare being set, baited and sprung. Only the participants are a deceitful woman and an unwise (and unsuspecting) young man.

It is interesting to note that this event is a real event that takes place in Solomon's kingdom. The practice of harlotry was forbidden by God in the Law (Deut. 22:21; 23:17-18). Yet, Solomon seems to permit its practice, by observing it without attempting to stop it. This shows us that Solomon's moral decline had already begun. John Phillips points out, "Solomon's morality had already degenerated into a mere philosophy. The psychology of the case interested him. He was little concerned with the sin."

However, we see (as in the prophet Jonah) that God still uses imperfect people to communicate His perfect Word. Here, Solomon attempts to help his son one more time, in the matter of morality. Solomon is exhorting Rehoboam ("My son"). Rehoboam proves himself to be a fool, despite his father's best attempts to impart wisdom to him. Notice...
